2016 Annual Report

INTRODUCTION

This is the fourth annual report of Rise Up Industries (RUI) which incorporated in the State of California as a public benefit non-profit corporation on May 13, 2013. RUI's fiscal year ends on December 31st.

We opened our Reentry Program this year with the hiring of our initial staff members and the opening of our Machine Shop Social Enterprise. A summary of the year's activities is provided in our Annual Newsletter attached as Enclosure 1.

GOVERNANCE

Vince Oliver stepped down from the board at the end of 2015 due to other time commitments. We welcomed Father Gil Gentile, SJ. on to our board. Father Gil is a Roman Catholic Jesuit Priest and a Licensed Clinical Social Worker. Father Gil brings a wealth of experience to the organization.

In July, the board resolved to extend all board terms by six months so that board terms will coincide with the end of our fiscal year. Thus, board terms now expire in December. Three of our officers and founding members' (president, vice-president and treasurer) terms expired in December. All three were reelected to second terms. However, the term lengths were staggered so that in the future their terms would not all expire in the same year.

Additionally, we have a fourteen-member Advisory Council.

Our Board of Directors and our Advisory Council members are listed in Enclosures 2 and 3 respectively.

STAFF

Our first paid staff member, Dustin Greeves, was hired in February as our Machine Shop Social Enterprise Shop Manager. Our shop is located in Santee and is discussed in more detail below.

Our second staff member, Emma Gallo, was hired in May and is the Office Manager of our office located in La Mesa.

SERVICES / ACTIVITIES

Reentry Program

RUI began its Reentry Program in March with the enrollment of our first member. A total of three members were enrolled into our 18-month program in 2016. The primary service which we provide is employment training and experience in our machine shop social enterprise. Additionally, our members are provided with a mentor, some outsourced case management services and tattoo removal services (if desired). Additional services will be provided as our program develops.

Tattoo Removal

RUI continued to provide tattoo removal services through May of 2016, serving 13 clients and providing a total of 20 treatments. Due to equipment failures, our services were suspended. In the meantime, we established a relationship with Change in Action, a nonprofit in Del Mar, that provides tattoo removal service. We are now able to refer our clients for treatment through this collaborative agreement.

Social Enterprises

Rise Up Industries Machine Shop

We opened our Machine Shop Social Enterprise in February, thanks in large part to Haas Automation Inc. who entrusted to us a Haas CNC TM-1P mill and provided a \$20,000 grant for our start-up. As mentioned earlier, we hired our machine shop manager in February and enrolled our first member in March. CNC Software donated to us four seats of MasterCam software, which is used to program CNC equipment. We completed our first three machine job orders in April, and enrolled our second member in May.

Our members are trained to be CNC (Computer Numeric Control) machine operators. This is a well paying trade that is in high demand. Our shop provides on-the-job training as our members are trained on contract work under the supervision of our machine shop manager.

This skill-training and employment experience is a key component of our Reentry Program. Thus, in order to be able to enroll more members into our Reentry Program, we developed plans for expanding our Machine Shop Social Enterprise. We presented the expansion project concept at our machine shop open house in May. The expansion project is described in enclosure 4.

Thanks to the initial funding response we received, we launched our 15-month expansion project in October. To date, we have expanded the square footage of our shop, purchased our second CNC mill (Haas Super Mini Mill) and enrolled our third member into the program. Completing the expansion project will be our focus for 2017. Once completed we will have the capacity to train 12 members at a time, graduating two every quarter and enrolling two new members every quarter.

In 2016, we completed 79 job orders for 11 customers and generated \$63,000 in revenue.

Other Social Enterprises

Our other three social enterprises, discussed below, do not currently employ any of our members. The intent with these enterprises is to develop our market and name recognition to the point where we will have viable employment opportunities for the members in our Reentry Program.

Rise Up Industries Coffee

We have continued to sell our coffee at two grocery stores: Major Market in Escondido, and Valley Farm Market in Spring Valley. We established an agreement with the Catholic Diocese of San Diego to provide coffee monthly for the Pastoral Center. We also met with Barons to negotiate the sale of our coffee at their stores. We expect a response by February 2017. Our gross revenue for 2016 was \$9,397.

Rise Up Industries Silk Screening and Embroidery

Our silk screening and embroidery social enterprise customer base continued to grow, however our overall sales were lower than in 2015. We had 22 orders, delivering more than 2,300 products and grossing over \$27,700.

Rise Up Industries Beef Jerky

This year we started a private labeled beef jerky enterprise. We provided a trial order to R.J Donovan State Correctional Facilities for sale in their commissaries. The intent was to help get our name out and to generate revenue for our program. Sales did not go as well as expected. We are reviewing other options.

Message From the Board



It's been a long road since our incorporation in May of 2013, but we are thrilled to report that this year we have enrolled our first members into our 18-month reentry program! We opened both our headquarters in La Mesa and our Machine Shop Social Enterprise in Santee.

Additionally, we have hired our first staff members: Emma Gallo, our Office Manager, and Dustin Greeves, our Machine Shop Manager. Last but not least, Father Gil Gentile joined our Board and Ronnie Matingka joined our Advisory Council. Below is a brief recap of our year and our projections for 2017.

2016

While we began serving individuals with our tattoo removal service in August 2013, it wasn't until we opened our Machine Shop Social Enterprise that we were able to enroll members into our 18-month reentry program.

Our headquarters opened in May and we hired our Office Manager. Emma wears many hats and is a great addition to the team. She is managing our silk screen and embroidery orders, is our HR person, was instrumental in helping to update and maintain our website, handles our social media, does our foundation research and the list goes on!

Dustin, our machine shop manager, joined the team the same day our CNC mill was delivered. He was responsible for setting up our shop, developing the training program, developing our customer base, bidding work, quality control, production and invoicing for the work. All of this on top of training our members and creating a very positive and supporting environment!

We have continued to build our silk screening, embroidery and coffee enterprises. Additionally, we opened our beef jerky social enterprise, providing our private labeled beef jerky to RJ Donovan.

2017 Projections

Our efforts in 2017 will primarily focus on the completion of the machine shop expansion which will give us the capacity to train twelve members at a time. We will increase our staff and will add case management, counseling, and spiritual programs to our services.

Machine Shop Social Enterprise

Interim employment in one of our social enterprises provides our members work experience and prepares them for full-time employment upon completion of the program. Our machine shop social enterprise trains our members to be Computer Numeric Control (CNC) machine operators. This is a well paying trade that is in high demand.

We opened our shop in February with a Haas TM-1P mill that was entrusted to us by Haas Automation Inc. Our grand opening was held on May 6th and was attended by over 80 of our supporters!

We were able to open our shop thanks to the generosity of many supporters:

Haas Automation - Entrusted TM-1P mill Haas Foundation - \$20K grant for tooling

We enrolled our first member in March and our second member in May. They are excited about the machining trade that they are learning. We are very proud of their progress and they will be great role models for our new members whom we will soon be adding to the team!



We train our members on contract work. This provides them real world work experience and also generates revenue to help off-set operational costs, which includes their wages. With virtually no marketing except word of mouth, we have developed a customer base that is continuing to grow. Within our first seven months, we have served ten customers and delivered over 60 job orders. We would like to recognize our customers:

Due to the early success of our machine shop, we developed an expansion plan for our machine shop in order to increase our capacity to train more members. The expansion project is anticipated to take 15 months. It will increase the number of CNC machines from one to five. Most importantly it will give us the capacity to train 12 members at a time, graduating two and enrolling two new members every quarter. We launched our expansion project in October with the purchase of a Haas CNC Super Mini Mill. The mill is scheduled to be delivered in late November. The purchase was made possible by a \$50k grant from the David C. Copley Foundation and donations from our Machine Shop Social Enterprise Expansion Founding Members. Thus far we have two Platinum (\$25k), one Silver (\$5k) and six Titanium (\$1k) Founding Members. We have budgeted \$470,000 for the full expansion.

Current Gang Activity

Rise Up Industries' mission is to minimize street gang involvement in San Diego County. At a National level, gangs are reported to be responsible for almost half of the violent crime in most jurisdictions. In San Diego, there are a reported 158 different gangs with approximately 7,500 documented gang members. In 2015, the City of San Diego had 911 gang related crimes including: 6 homicides, 13 attempted homicides and 200 assaults with a deadly weapon. The entire county is negatively impacted in terms of unsafe neighborhoods, increase in drug and human trafficking, devaluation of property, gang graffiti and increased costs in law enforcement, judicial and correctional systems.

Rise Up Industries

Machine Shop Social Enterprise

Rise Up Industries (RUI) Machine Shop Social Enterprise is a key component of our Reentry Program. Successful reentry and departure from gang life requires employment. Our Machine Shop Social Enterprise both trains and employs our members as Computer Numeric Control (CNC) machine operators. This is a well paying trade that is in high demand. The skill gap in this industry is projected to increase significantly over the next decade.

Our machine shop not only provides specific job skill training but additionally provides employment experience, work ethic development and customer satisfaction training. Our members are provided on-the-job training on contract work for local customers. In order to provide our members with real work environment experiences, where quality control, time management and customer satisfaction are high priorities, it is important that the shop is not over-staffed. Therefore, in order for us to increase our training capacity, we need to expand our machine shop and customer base. Our expansion project is projected to take 15 months and was launched in October 2016.

Original Program

Our original machine shop was in a 500 square foot facility, had one CNC machine (Haas TM-1P CNC Mill), one full-time staff member and two trainees.

Expansion Project

Purpose: Increase capacity to train more reentry members in our 18-month program.

Goal: Capacity to train 12 members at a time, graduating two members every quarter and to enrolling two new members every quarter

Elements of Expansion:

* Facility: increase from 500 square foot to a 3,200 square foot facility

* Equipment: increase from one CNC mill to three CNC mills and two CNC lathes:

- allows a broader training experience for our members

- provides a greater range of production capability

* Staff: increase from one full-time staff member to two

* Members: increase from two to twelve members

* Shifts: increase from one to two shifts (doubles capacity with no increase in facility or

equipment costs)

Budget: \$470,000

* The budget includes

- increase in lease and utilities
- tenant improvements / moving
- equipment costs
- wages for additional staff member

* Based on projected contract work, program will achieve a positive cash flow by 4th quarter 2017

* Start date: Oct 1, 2016 * Duration: 15 months
